

Our traditional arts were enjoyed by 2,309 people, with 85 different artists and practitioners keeping this vital work alive and relevant for future generations.

Over 300 people welcomed the Japanese New Year at our 37th annual Kotohajime in the Aratani Theatre — where we

explored many threads in the theme of Hatsu Ori or First Weaving-- with 58 artists.







17,160 celebrants joined JACCC in song, dance, and other cultural traditions for festivities such as FandangObon, Keiro no Hi, Hinamasturi and more during FY19 -20.

The 79th Nisei Week in August 2019 welcomed **15,000** audience members to JACCC.







A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

As the Japanese American Cultural & Community Center (JACCC) stands at a crossroads in 2020, we look back across our more than 40-year history as a Los Angeles non-profit and survey the current challenges of a global pandemic and a myriad of intense social, economic and urban development forces in Downtown Los Angeles.

Despite these unprecedented circumstances, JACCC is proud to have accomplished a great deal this past year and stands ready to transform its campus into a one-of-a-kind destination for cultural and heritage tourism and a re-energized magnet for visitors from across Los Angeles and the world. In addition, we are continuing to solidify our role as a positive force in Little Tokyo, as we seek new and creative ways to enhance our core cultural identity and secure our economic base.

Perhaps our proudest accomplishment was the completion of construction on the beautiful Toshizo Watanabe Culinary Cultural Center. JACCC stands ready to actively position the TWCCC at the center of our newly integrated visitor experience. And, although the classes, guest chef appearances, and special events that were planned to coincide with seasonal changes, holidays and other JACCC arts programming were abruptly put on hold due to COVID-19, we look forward to launching these as soon as circumstances allow.

Sustainable Little Tokyo (SLT), another highlight of our work, is a group of organizations and people who love Little Tokyo and came together to imagine a future for our historic Japantown. Led by JACCC, Little Tokyo Community Council, and Little Tokyo Service Center, SLT is now nationally recognized within the fields of creative placemaking and racial equity in the arts. It has earned major grant funding from The Kresge Foundation, Surdna Foundation, and The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Since its inception, SLT has evolved into a robust program with a focus on community driven arts and cultural projects that bring the community together, support our neighborhood, and advocate for the longer-term vision for equitable development.

When the pandemic forced cancellation of all in-person events and workshops, SLT quickly went virtual and is now creating new ways to stay in touch with our most vulnerable community members. Our virtual workshops have gone viral, with as many as 100 attendees from around the world. JACCC's work in sustaining traditional Japanese cultural practices such as Kado (flower arranging), Chado (tea ceremony), and Shodo (calligraphy) remain at the core of our efforts. We enthusiastically seek to preserve these timeless practices and inspire younger practitioners to carry the traditions forward in the modern world.

Although JACCC has curtailed expenses within the constraints and the impact of COVID-19, the lack of revenue from ticket sales and rentals has had a significant impact on our current financial health. Despite this challenging reality, we are confident that with the support of our community, volunteers and donors, JACCC will weather the storm and emerge stronger than ever. We thank you for your ongoing support and look forward to welcoming you back to JACCC, where we can celebrate on the Noguchi-designed Plaza, in the TWCCC and James Irvine Japanese garden, the Aratani Theatre and in the Doizaki Gallery.

COVID-19 adversly impacted JACCC's rental and earned income. Tenant rents will decline in FY21. 20% of tenants are in negotiation to reduce rental space. One tenant (5%) has left the facility. Theater, garden, gallary, TWCCC rental and programing are not expected to resume until after January 2021.

Operating and Program Expense \$ 3,396 \$ 3,002 -12%

People costs are slightly over HALF of the operating costs of JACCC. Occupany incuding utilities, security and insurance is \$900K annually approximately 30% of FY20 total operating expense. JACCC will continue to exercise fiscal restraint.

TWCCC Capital Expense \$ 383 \$ 2,606




The TWCCC is substantially complete. Certificate of Occupancy is expected in Q2 FY21. Final costs for \$921K will be expended in FY21.


