JACCC was once just a dream. Our founders were told that building a Japanese American cultural and community center in the middle of Downtown Los Angeles couldn't be done—but with the support of the entire community, the dream was realized. Over 50 years later, inspired by the beautiful 2.2-acre campus they built, we continue to present arts, culture, and programs to serve and support our elders, youth, culture-bearers, Little Tokyo residents, Japanese Americans, and guests from around the world.

In the past year, we welcomed visitors to the John & Susan Sasaki Tokonoma Reception and the Kanai Shudo-An, while offering a sneak peek to our Toshizo Watanabe Exhibition Center (TWEC). These spaces allow us to offer large-scale and more intimate events and programs that attract both new and returning visitors. In addition, we have been working to boost organizational success by strengthening our staff's skills and by executing marketing projects to reach an audience that numbers in the millions.

While we celebrate these successes, we have much more to do. We recognize that we are living in a time of great change and challenge. After several decades of service, our beloved campus is in need of repairs. We look back on this history on Tongva land to take inspiration from Bridget "Biddy" Mason, the formerly enslaved midwife, landowner, and cultural mother of Los Angeles who, on the site where JACCC now stands, founded a community in the late 1800s; from Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley, who dreamed of making Los Angeles an international destination and then welcomed the world here; from artist Isamu Noguchi who shared Mayor Bradley's dream and designed our iconic plaza, centered around the sculpture he dedicated, *To the Issei*; and to those who built the Japanese American Veterans War Memorial Court, proudly situated on JACCC's campus, reminding us of the self-sacrifice, loyalty, and courage of Japanese Americans.

Continuing in their footsteps, we are also dreaming big, imagining the possibilities, and working to strengthen our community, opening new opportunities for all of us—and for the generations to come.

In 2022 JACCC lost its largest tenant, FIA Insurance Services, Inc., but was able to makeup the loss in income with additional tenants and has now exceeded FY22 tenant levels. TWCCC revenues grew 21%. The Aratani Theatre had a deficit of \$287K, before depreciation.

Personnel expense grew 3% FY23 vs. FY22 which is approximately half of total expense. At the same time, total operating & program expense increased at a rate less than the increase in earned income, 11.8% vs. 13.4%.


